Established after the 1987–89 repeat Gujarat droughts, All India Disaster Mitigation Institute (AIDMI) is a registered public charitable trust based in Ahmedabad, Gujarat, and working in several states of India.

AIDMI's Expertise

1. India is becoming a hotspot of new and emerging risks because of climate change and increasing vulnerability to other natural hazards.
2. AIDMI is one of the first organisations in India, which is working towards bridging the gap between policy, practice and research related to disaster mitigation and climate change adaptation.
3. AIDMI has expanded its work over the years to cover 14 types of disasters in eighteen areas of India and beyond to nine countries in Asia.
4. As an action and learning organization, AIDMI works towards promoting Disaster Risk Mitigation and Adaptation

to Climate Change Risk. By supporting, capturing, processing and disseminating disaster related information, lessons and innovative ideas as well as conducting stakeholder round tables, capability trainings of trainers, reviews and reflections, evaluations and impact studies, and pilot or demonstration projects AIDMI places the citizens in the centre of returning risks.




